## **Official Prison Visitors Network**

The Pennsylvania Prison Society has a statewide network of over 400 volunteers who visit inmates and monitor prison conditions. Official Visitors help those who are incarcerated with issues ranging from reentry resources, to conditions, to medical concerns, and more. Pennsylvania's Official Visitor Prison Visitation Act is unique in the nation, providing and assuring Prison Society Official Visitors access to state prisons and county jails across Pennsylvania.

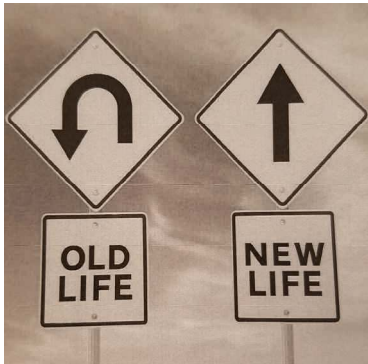


We offer incarcerated parents in certain Philadelphia jails an interactive course designed to teach skills in communication, child development, and family dynamics.

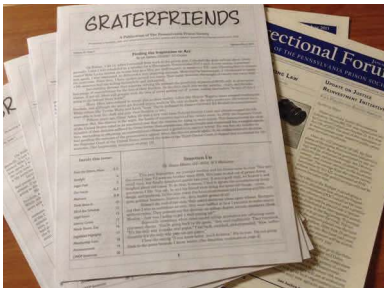
