### **Pioneer Human Services Job Training**

Our job readiness training program, Roadmap to Success, is a 150 hour training course that is given over a four and a half week period. Men and women who are overcoming the challenges of substance abuse or mental health issues, or have been incarcerated in Washington State can be referred to the program through their case manager or community corrections officer for the application process. Priority is given to people currently in a work release program, or in a Pioneer treatment or housing program. To be eligible for the training program, applicants must: Be physically able to work; read, write and communicate in English; and pass a drug test.
